



Outstanding Staff and Schools

- The Communications Division of the Olathe Public Schools earned two recognitions for digital presence and in-house video in the 2020 Publication & Digital Media Awards presented by National School Public Relations Association.
- The Olathe North High School theatre program received the Outstanding Overall Production award for "Bright Star" at the Blue Star Awards by Starlight Theatre.
- The Olathe Public Schools and Johnson County Mental Health Center received a grant from the Kansas Department of Education to hire two therapists to work together and provide mental health services to Olathe Public Schools families.
- All five Olathe high schools were named to the U.S. News and World Report's 2021 Best High Schools Rankings. Four Olathe high schools were named to the top-25 in the U.S. News and World Report's list of Best Kansas High Schools. Olathe Northwest High School ranked fifth, Olathe East High School ranked 17th, Olathe South High School ranked 20th and Olathe North High School ranked 22nd.
- The Association of School Business Officials International awarded the Olathe School District its Meritorious Budget Award for the 2020-21 budget year. This was the 24th consecutive year the Olathe School District has received this honor.

Each year the district's Individuals with Disabilities Education Improvement Act (IDEA) plans are evaluated by the state based on nearly 20 performance indicators categorized as "results" or "compliance." Some of the performance indicators are graduation and dropout rate, least restrictive environment, participation and proficiency in assessment testing, timely evaluations of students, and transition to post-secondary life. The state's performance plan and evaluation of individual districts are required by the U.S. Department of Education.


