A Message from our Board of Education



The Olathe Public Schools Strategic Plan 2019-24 outlines the district's goals and core values to set the road map to help students achieve great success. The Strategic Plan was approved in October 2019, but began with the development of the Portrait of a Graduate during the 2018-19 school year. District staff and the Board of Education, with much community input, created a Portrait of a Graduate to outline what we want our students to know and be able to do when they graduate from our schools.



• Four students earned a perfect score on the ACT Exam. While the actual number of students earning a composite score of 36 varies from year to year, less than one-tenth of 1 percent of students taking the ACT earn a top score.


