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TIER 1

High quality differentiated instruction including both whole and small group methods for all students.

TIER 2

Fluid, timely, targeted and remedial intervention based on protocol screening and placement assessments alongside peers with similar needs, in addition to Tier 1 instruction.

TIER 3

Intensification of targeted supports based on individual needs of any individual student.



Third Quarter Academics: Quality Tier 1 Instruction

Our focus year-round as a district is quality Tier 1 instruction, which is the core instruction delivered to all students on a daily basis. This tier also includes high-quality differentiated instruction including whole and small group methods for all students.

"Quality Tier 1 instruction is essential in providing a strong foundation for all students, reducing the need for intensive interventions," Chief Academic Officer Dr. Tim Reves said. "By implementing best practices in instruction, educators can proactively address individual learning needs to ensure skills mastery and decrease the need for intervention. This approach not only supports academic success but also allows for individual growth at the student level to improve outcomes."

Focusing on strong Tier 1 instruction and preparation is one key to recruiting and maintaining high quality educators.

"We have no interest in the status quo. We are looking for champions for kids who will meet them where they are and take them to their next level day after day," Director of Secondary Human Resources Justin Howe said. "By hiring candidates who are focused on this quality everyday instruction, Olathe will always be a place where students are prepared for their future and families know they are getting the best!"

Another essential component to effective instruction is our commitment to the Multi-Tiered System of Supports (MTSS) and effective, research-based interventions. Learning needs are complex, and these tier categories are merely a starting point. Within each tier, the intensity of support can vary. All educators are encouraged to adjust the intensity of interventions and instruction within each tier to meet the student's individual needs.

"Teachers deeply understand that learning is so much more than content in our books," Olathe Public Schools Recruiting Liaison Amy Hillman said. "They are gifted in seeing the whole learner and that each student is an asset for exactly who they are and their individual goals for their future."

This school year, Olathe Public Schools had two educators recognized at the state level for their teaching. Back in September, Prairie Trail Middle School eighth-grade social studies teacher Taylor Bussinger was named the 2024 Kansas Teacher of the Year. In January, Olathe West High School biology teacher Janelle Craig was selected as a winner of the 2024 Kansas Horizon Award. The Kansas Horizon Award program identifies and recognizes exemplary first-year educators at the elementary and secondary classroom level.

"As a teacher, you hope to be in a place that makes you feel like you made the right decision," Craig said. "Being in a tough field and receiving this recognition means that there are people in my building and district who see me. I plan to continue leaning into my passion for generations to come!"

These amazing educators are just two examples of many in Olathe Public Schools providing high quality Tier 1 instruction every single day. By keeping high expectations for excellence, students are put in the best position to be prepared for their future, and it all starts with Tier 1 instruction.

Inclusion is a Core Value of Olathe Public Schools

In Olathe Public Schools, we are committed to our strategic plan goal to actively include and value all students and staff to meet their unique needs. We do this by providing equitable opportunities in order to develop their understanding and respect of differences, thus preparing them to live in an inclusive, global community and world. When students feel they belong, their capacity to learn and grow academically, socially and emotionally increases.

"At the elementary level, we focus on kindness, communication and how to be a good friend in the classroom," Director of Culture and Belonging Kathleen Smith said. "At the middle school level, we focus on students learning to collaborate with each other and communicate through classes and activities that truly help build relationships. At the high school level, students continue to grow academically and socially, while also picking up important life skills through critical thinking, problem solving and cross-cultural communication, to name a few."

One of those activities that students have the opportunity to participate in is the annual Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. Contest, a longtime arts competition for students in partnership with the City of Olathe's Human Relations Commission,

Garmin and Olathe Public Schools. This year's theme was "Know Your Neighbor," pulled from Dr. King's quote: "People fail to get along because they fear each other; they fear each other because they don't know each other; they don't know each other because they have not communicated with each other." This quote directly reflects one of the district's core values: inclusivity.

Olathe South High School senior Skylar Saragusa took home the "Best of Show" award with her written submission "The Waiting Room."

"The inspiration for my piece was that the world is so beautiful, but it will never be perfect," Saragusa said. "I believe people have good intentions but may wait to take action to make our society better because they're afraid they'll do it wrong, or it won't be 'perfect.' But if all of us beautifully imperfect people choose to know our neighbor, be kind, do good, and be vulnerable with who we are together — we can make our world better."

With inclusivity being a core value of the district, it not only reinforces social and emotional wellbeing but it ensures a sense of belonging for every child who walks into our schools.

Changes Coming in the 2024-25 School Year

New Start and End Times Beginning in the 2024-25 School Year

At the regular December Board of Education meeting, the board voted to change the start and end time schedule beginning in the 2024-25 school year after much discussion and evaluation of feedback from parents, students and staff. To learn more, please visit *www.olatheschools.org/startandendtime*, which contains all the information from the last two years including the start and end time committee meeting presentations, feedback from the surveys and input at all levels and answers to frequently asked questions.

- High schools and Prairie Learning Center: 7:40 a.m. 2:40 p.m.
- Middle schools and Heartland Early Childhood Center: 8:20 a.m. 3:20 p.m.
- Elementary schools and Harmony Early Childhood Center: 8:55 a.m. 3:55 p.m.

This recommendation is the least disruptive to the overall system, both survey data from families and staff and input from

secondary students supported this schedule, and it is a longterm solution to address the labor market with annual financial savings.

The district understands this change will impact every family differently, and the magnitude of this decision has not been lost. Please be on the lookout for more information on solutions impacting each level and the transportation restrictions in place for this year that will be removed. Approving this new schedule now gives our district, families and staff a full semester and summer to make necessary plans and adjustments before school starts in August 2024.

Olathe Public Schools wants to thank its students, staff and families for their engagement in the last two school years as we have worked to allow access to educational opportunities for all students while also addressing our transportation challenges head-on with a three-tier bus schedule.

Open Enrollment Policy

The Olathe open enrollment policy was approved during the Dec. 7 Board of Education meeting. This is a direct result of Kansas House Bill 2567, which applies to all public schools in the state and takes effect in the 2024-25 school year. HB 2567 states all districts must allow non-resident students, who reside

in Kansas, to enroll in and attend any school if the district has the capacity. All Kansas school districts were required to adopt an open enrollment policy outlining their own procedures by Jan. 1, 2024. A public hearing was held Nov. 2 in our district.

The policy includes an in-district transfer period that began on Jan. 4, followed by a district employee transfer period starting March 1. District enrollment capacity must be determined by May 1 and posted on the district website by June 1. Non-resident applications will be accepted June 1-30, followed by a non-resident lottery selection process July 1-15.

Transportation will not be provided. Once admitted to an Olathe school, the child could continue attending Olathe schools K-12 if they maintain good standing. Eligibility to participate in Kansas State High School Activities Association activities for open enrollment transfer students would be determined by KSHSAA policies.

Graduation Requirement Changes for Class of 2028 and Beyond

In May 2023, the Kansas State Board of Education approved updated high school graduation requirements that will take effect with the class of 2028. A special Board of Education meeting was held on Sept. 21 to dive into the details of these changes.

Kindergarten Enrollment on April 11

Kindergarten Enrollment for the Olathe Public Schools will be held from 1-6 p.m. Thursday, April 11 in each elementary school. Kindergarten Enrollment is an event for parents and their future kindergartners (children who will turn 5 on or before Aug. 31). Current kindergarten students do not have class that day.

Families should bring:

- proof of residency such as a utility bill,
- information about the child's immunizations and inoculations.
- a certified copy of the birth certificate of the child or hospital birth certificate with attending physician's signature and superintendent of the hospital's signature,
- as an alternative for the child in the custody of the Secretary of Social and Rehabilitation Services, a certified copy of the court order placing the child in the custody of the secretary.

State law establishes the age at which a child may enter kindergarten or first grade, and the district cannot deviate from the law. Reminder: parents must present a form of identification upon entering the building.

Families who are not sure which elementary school their child should attend may use the school locator feature on the district website. Please contact your child's school for additional details if you have questions about Kindergarten enrollment For basic enrollment information, please visit *olatheschools.org/enrollment*.

"Kindergarten Enrollment in April gives our future students







and their caregivers a first glimpse into the kindergarten experience," Executive Director of Early Childhood Dr. Kim Hawkins said. "This is a wonderful opportunity for children and families to meet teachers and school staff while engaging in fun activities. This is an exciting time for families and the Olathe Public Schools staff is looking forward to partnering with families to make kindergarten an awesome experience!"






